



1 French Broad River Overlook

This overlook offers a vista of the French Broad River, the third oldest river in the world behind the Nile of Egypt and the New River of North Carolina.

2 Meade's Quarry

Meade's Quarry was a marble quarry. From this site, marble was used for some of the most prominent governmental structures in Washington D.C.

3 Alex Haley Statue

The statue was built in honor of the famous author, Alex Haley, who wrote *The Autobiography of Malcolm X* and *Roots*. Towering over 20 feet, it is the tallest statue of an African-American to date.

4 Treaty of Holston Statue

The Treaty of Holston was negotiated in 1791 between the Cherokee and William Blount to establish territorial boundaries and led to the naming of Knoxville, after Henry Knox, Secretary of War.

5 Sunsphere at World's Fair Park

Constructed for the 1982 World's Fair, the Sunsphere is 266 feet tall. Water play fountains reside near the base of the structure in World's Fair Park.

6 Neyland Stadium

Home of University of Tennessee football, Neyland Stadium is the largest football stadium in the South and the fourth largest in the nation.

7 Thompson-Boling Arena

Home of the Tennessee Volunteers and Lady Vols basketball programs, this multi-purpose arena has seen many national championship teams over the years. The arena seats 21,000 people.

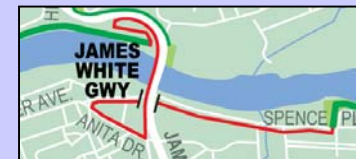
8 Knoxville Skatepark

Opened in 2008, the Knoxville Skatepark is an answered prayer to many local extreme sports enthusiasts. The 15,000 square-foot facility is a Tony Hawk Foundation sponsored skatepark.

9 Indian Burial Mound - Sequoyah Hills

Sequoyah Greenway, which runs through the median of the Sequoyah Hills Neighborhood, passes along a 1,000-year-old pre-Cherokee Indian Mound. A marker indicates the location of the mound. Due to years of erosion, the mound is relatively small.

Getting to Will Skelton Gwy



Headed east on the James White Greenway, before crossing under the James White Pkwy bridge, turn left onto Riverside Dr. Stay on the shoulder, turning right onto the access road to the James White Pkwy bridge. Stay on the shoulder across the bridge; Take the first exit and turn right on Anita Dr. Stay on Anita Dr. as it becomes Sevier Ave.; Turn right from Sevier onto Island Home Ave. Island Home Ave. becomes Spence Pl. as you enter the Island Home Park neighborhood. Turn left from Spence Pl. onto Estelle Circle, and from Estelle turn left into Island Home Park. Will Skelton Greenway is at the east end of the park.
